

The More The Merrier - there are, generally, donuts as well.



THE DEMONSTRATION

Next month's challenge is a top but please bring at least two as we are going to give the extra ones to the Ronald McDonald House.




It seems that young turners try to turn tops. It is a good way to hone quite a few skills actually. Cutting wood and gluing up blanks, spindle turning, being precise with tools especially a spindle gouge, some sanding, and finishing. No two turners seem to turn tops the same way. After awhile new turners stop with the tops until they get to be sixty or older and then they seem to start again. Perhaps it's because they have finally gotten their skills down enough and are skilled enough to take up top turning again. They can more easily, perhaps, see the enchantment of variety.







This one will be turned out of walnut and will put some pink on it - Jerry is big into coloring - and pink is huge with the NFL now and breast cancer month. He started making the blank with a 1" dowel and now uses an inch and a quarter. Drill an inch and a quarter hole get the dowel in and glued and let it set up good. The first thing is to make the walnut round.

Jerry also stressed some of the safety aspects to consider: wearing eye protection, knowing your tools, making sure that they are sharp, standing outside of the "zone" when starting the lathe.



He indicated that everyone seems to have at least one cut that seems to be the most difficult for them and for him it is the straight across planing cut. After making round, the shaping of the body is the next thing to do. When the body of the top is shaped the way you want, then the spindle is shaped. There is no exact way to determine the length of the tip and the handle.





Top turning is a highly skilled activity -not for the faint of heart. It is a great challenge for the imagination.



SAFETY

The AAW has as one of its major goals, to inform turners of the best safety practices to use in the pursuit of our art. One of the major focus points of the last AAW symposium was safety. at the top of the page in the AAW web site devoted to safety it says "Safe, effective use of a wood lathe requires study and knowledge of procedures for using this tool. Read, thoroughly understand, and follow the label warnings on the lathe and in the owner/operator's manual. Safety guidelines from an experienced instructor, video, or book are a good source of important safety procedures. Please work safely."

Please do yourself a favor and go to <http://www.woodturner.org/resources/safety.htm> and read the 26 items they have posted on their site. When you are done with that, poke around the site if you've not been there before. Even if you have, you just may find something new.
